Even in the Old Testament prayers and alms were offered for the souls of the dead by those who thought "well and religiously concerning the resurrection." It was believed that "they who had fallen asleep with godliness had great grace laid up for them" and that "it is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from sins." 

How to Gain an Indulgence

An **indulgence** is "the remission before God of the temporal punishment due for sins already forgiven as far as their guilt is concerned, which the follower of Christ with the proper dispositions and under certain determined conditions acquires through the intervention of the Church which, as minister of the Redemption, authoritatively dispenses and applies the treasury of the satisfaction won by Christ and the saints. An indulgence is partial or plenary according as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due sin" (*Indulgentiarum Doctrina*, n.1-2).

To obtain this remission there are proper dispositions and certain conditions predetermined by the Church that must be met. Firstly, one must have the intention to gain the indulgence, and perform the works at the time and in the manner prescribed.

To gain a **Plenary Indulgence** (only one per day), the faithful must be in the state of grace and the following conditions must accompany the prescribed act:

- 1. have the interior disposition of complete detachment from sin, even venial sin;
- 2. receive the **sacrament of confession** within 20 days of the act, one confession covers many indulgences;
- 3. receive the **Holy Eucharist** within 20 days of the indulgenced act, but one Communion per indulgence;
- 4. and recite **prayers for the intentions of the Holy Father** (one Our Father and one Hail Mary is suggested as a minimum, but any other additional prayers may be added).

All attachment to sin, even venial sin, must be absent. If one's disposition is less than perfect or if some of the above conditions are not fulfilled, the indulgence becomes partial. Library: Praying for the Dead and Gaining Indulgences During November |

31st Sunday: All the Faithful Departed

"The world'ssearch engine is Google, while Christian [Catholic] search engine is the Bible and Sacred Traditions."

Today we express our love to those who have died; this we do through the Holy Mass, the greatest of all prayers. Our prayers and love are part of what unites us with our loved ones.

The Book of Wisdom (3:1-9) gives us a very good reason to pray for the dead. The desire of God has always been to place the soul of man beyond destruction. But this privilege belongs to only those judged righteous.

We are praying for our deceased loved ones because no one is perfect, "If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us" (1 John 1:8). It is because of this imperfection that we offer prayers for our deceased ones and no one can understand perfectly what goes on during this journey.

Catholics (Ukrainian, Orthodox, Roman...) believe that through the prayers of the faithful on earth, the dead are cleansed of their sins so they may enter into heaven. Praying for the dead is one of the spiritual works of mercy. The body of Jesus (the church; Ephesians 1:21-22) is caught up in a triangular relationship. The "Church Suffering," waiting for what we, the "Church Militant," would do to alleviate their suffering so that they might join the saints in heaven, the "Church Triumphant."

The above paragraph stated clearly – Heaven, Helland Purgatory. I would give some supporting biblical passages to help us understand more about them.

In the gospel of Luke12:47-48, Jesus gave us a glimpse of what divine justice looks like when he spoke about servants who will get a severe beating and those who will get a light beating based on their level of guilt:

- Heaven: "The souls of the righteous are in the hands of God" (Wisdom 3:1).
- *Hell*: "Then they will go away to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life" (Matthew 25:46)
- *Purgatory*: "All unrighteousness is sin, and there is a sin not leading to death-total condemnation" (1 John 5:17). Souls in purgatory are those who need purification (purgation) to enter heaven.

Actually, death can be scary, particularly as we realize our own imperfections. Yet, through death, God'slove purifies us so that we can enjoy the fullness of the eternal life which Jesus has gained for us through his death and resurrection.

But for those who have refused to acknowledge the life which Jesus offered to them, death *may not* be a joyful transition to eternal life, but an eternal separation from the God whom they have chosen not to accept or with whom they have wanted no relationship.

Jesus Christ is the ultimate link or bridge to the world-beyond, since he has lived on both sides of life and has gone through the death-experience. His resurrection is the way through which he intends us all to travel so that we can experience, the risen life that he shares with God the Father.

The Christian teaching about new life is not about the mechanics of what we will be like or what sort of place heaven might be, but rather of a relationship. It is about a relationship of intimacy with the Lord Jesus.

If eternal life is a relationship with the Lord Jesus who died for us, descended into the realm of the dead and then rose for us, freeing us from the bonds of sinfulness, then the way in which we must live in this life, that is, the true meaning of human life, is also to be found in our ability and our willingness to answer the call of Jesus to fellowship with him and to follow him.

It is our prayer that the faithful departed continue to bask in this love ages unending.
